

European Accessibility Act Compliance for Digital Accessibility

If you are located in the EU, sell or do business in the EU, or target EU consumers, you need to be aware of the European Accessibility Act.

If your business or your clients are located in the European Union (EU) you need to be aware of EAA. The European Accessibility Act (EAA) is a landmark legislation that aims to harmonize accessibility standards for a wide range of products and services across the European Union. It's a game-changer for digital accessibility, setting clear requirements for websites, mobile apps, software, and other digital information and communication technology (ICT). This act is not just about ticking boxes for compliance; it's about fostering a truly inclusive digital society where everyone can participate equally.



Is Your Industry Affected?

Compliance is needed if your business is located or serves customers in the EU and is one of the following:

Public Sector Bodies

Government Agencies: From large national ministries (e.g., Ministry of Health) to local municipalities and city councils. Websites, online forms, and digital documents must all be accessible.

Educational Institutions: Universities, colleges, and schools at all levels. Equal access must be provided for learning management systems, online libraries, and digital learning materials.

Healthcare Providers: Public hospitals, clinics, and healthcare agencies must make their online appointment systems, patient portals, and health information accessible.

Public Transportation: Transport services operated by public authorities, such as buses, trams, and trains, must have accessible websites and ticketing machines.

Law Enforcement and Emergency Services: Police departments, fire services, and emergency response units need to ensure their online services and communication systems are accessible.



Is Your Industry Affected? Continued

Private Sector Businesses

E-commerce Platforms: Online retailers like Amazon, eBay, and Zalando must make their websites and apps accessible, ensuring everyone can browse products, make purchases, and manage accounts.

Financial Institutions: Banks, insurance companies, and investment firms must make their online banking platforms, mobile apps, and customer service portals accessible.

Telecommunications Companies: Providers like Vodafone, Orange, and Deutsche Telekom must confirm their websites, customer service portals, and mobile apps are accessible.

Entertainment and Media Companies: Streaming services like Netflix, Spotify, and Disney+ need to ensure their platforms are accessible.

Software Developers: Companies that create software, operating systems, and mobile apps must design their products with accessibility in mind.

Micro-enterprises

The EAA provides a specific exemption for micro-enterprises, recognizing potentially limited resources. Micro-enterprises are businesses that have:

- Fewer than 10 full-time and part-time employees, AND
- Annual turnover or balance sheet total not exceeding 2 million euros

Examples of micro-enterprises include:

- Small local businesses: A family-owned bakery with a basic website for online orders.
- Freelancers and sole traders: A web designer who works independently and has a small online portfolio.
- Startups in their early stages: A tech startup with a small team developing a new mobile app.

While exempt from the EAA's requirements, micro-enterprises are still encouraged to adopt accessible practices! This not only benefits their customers with disabilities but can also enhance their brand reputation and expand their market.



How Do You Comply with the EAA?

The EAA primarily aligns with the following technical standards:

EN 301 549: This European standard provides detailed technical requirements for the accessibility of ICT products and services. It covers a wide range of disabilities, including visual, auditory, cognitive, and motor impairments.

WCAG 2.1 Level AA: The Web Content Accessibility Guidelines (WCAG) are internationally recognized standards for web accessibility. The EAA requires compliance with Level AA, which ensures a good level of accessibility for most users.

Success criteria for web content is based on these principles:

Perceivable - e.g. Creating text alternatives for meaningful images

Operable - e.g. A site is completely navigable with keyboard commands

Understandable - e.g. A web page functions in a way that is predictable and logical

Robust - e.g. A site accepts keyboard commands, regardless of browser or operating system

Your Additional Compliance Requirements:

- Provide accessible customer service: Offer support through various channels, such as phone, email, and chat. Your staff should be trained in disability awareness and etiquette.
- Make accessibility information readily available: Clearly communicate your accessibility features and offer support options on your websites and other platforms.

•	Continuously Test: Organizations should conduct regular accessibility testing throughout digital asset creation and development. This includes
	automated testing, manual testing, and user testing with people with disabilities.

Maintain Documentation: Keep track of your accessibility efforts, including policies, training records, testing results, and remediation plans.

• **Provide Accessibility Training:** Regular training should be provided to all staff involved in the creation, management, or delivery of digital content and services. Training should cover accessibility principles, WCAG guidelines, assistive technologies, and accessibility testing methods.

- Prepare for Reasonable Modifications: Organizations must be willing to modify some policies, practices, and procedures to ensure that individuals with disabilities have equal access to their goods, services, and facilities. This may include adjusting deadlines, providing alternative formats, or offering personalized assistance.
- Facilitate Effective Communication: Consider the needs and preferences of individuals with disabilities. Are you providing plain language, visual aids, and offering sign language interpreters, or using assistive technologies where needed?

What to Do if You Can't Achieve Compliance by These Deadlines

The EAA includes a "disproportionate burden" clause, allowing organizations to deviate from the technical standards when organizations can demonstrate that full compliance would impose a significant and unreasonable burden.

In these cases you still **must** provide:

- Thorough documentation of why compliance is an undue burden, including rationale
- Notification to relevant national authorities
- If an exemption is claimed, it must be detailed in the companies accessibility statement
- Reasonable adjustments to improve accessibility where possible
